Texas Drug Wars

On Saturday, March 12, the Discovery Channel gave the public an inside look at the state's efforts to fight gangs and drug cartels on the Texas border.

The show, titled "Texas Drug Wars" focused on the Texas Rangers Reconnaissance Team, DPS Aviation and SWAT, Highway Patrol and Criminal Investigation Division agents as they work with local, state and federal agencies and Texas Military Forces to meet the increasing threat posed by vicious cartels and gangs who are determined to transport illegal drugs into the U.S.

"DPS, working with our state, local and federal partners as part of a statewide unified effort, has taken unprecedented steps to protect Texas from an insidious threat," said DPS Director Steven C. McCraw. "This show, which records our brave men and women of law enforcement as they conduct dangerous border operations, gives the citizens of Texas and the nation an opportunity to witness the daily fight to keep them safe."

A Visit From China

The Texas Ranger Hall of Fame and Museum hosted a delegation of visiting Chinese police officers on Friday, March 4, 2011. The group toured the Museum and visited with Major Kirby Dendy of Company "F" Texas Rangers.

Mr. Hao-sheng represents 10,000 police officers in his province and 10 million residents. By comparison, Major Dendy represents one of the 144 Texas Rangers protecting 25 million residents in Texas. The delegates were eager to learn about the work the Rangers perform, their jurisdiction, gualifications to become Rangers, and their history. Dr. Ning translated for the group.

The Chinese delegate consisted of six members. They were:

1. Ding Jian-rong - Dean of the Department of Public Security at Zhejiang Police College (head of delegation). Professor Ding is also a Commissioner for the Jejiang province, which has 52 million people.

2. Guan Hao-sheng - Deputy Director (D-ty Commissioner) of Political Division of the Public Security Bureau for the city of Hangzhou. He is the head of Intelligence Bureau of the Chinese Police for the province and specifically for the city of 6 million people plus 4 million in surrounding city's jurisdiction.

3. Liu Jian-jun - Deputy Director of Public Security Bureau for Xihu, the region around Hangzhou with 4 million people in the jurisdiction.

4. Wang Hong-fang - Secretary of Discipline Inspection Commission of Public Security Subbureau in Hangzhau .

5. Hu Guo-sheng - Deputy Director (Deputy Police commissioner) of Public Security Bureau in Tongxiang with 2 million people in the region.

6. Dr. Ye Ning - Lecturer at Zheijang Police College and a forensic linguistics expert (interrogation, law and language analysis).

Waco and to the sponsors, the Bellmead Lions Club and the Greater Lacy Lakeview Chamber of Commerce.


Recap: Texas Independence Day Celebration
