


Collections Donation

Mr. Bob Hendrix of Arcadia recently presented the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame with a Model 1894 Winchester .30-30 lever action rifle made about 1898 and a Colt .41 Long New Army Navy Revolver made in 1900-01. These family heirlooms add a dimension to understanding Texas and the Texas Rangers at the turn of the 20th century.

Mr. Hendrix' grandfather, Guy Speed, joined the Texas Volunteer Guard in 1900. The Texas Volunteer Guard was a State militia of up to 4,800 men deployed in infantry, cavalry and artillery units. Speed served in Company D of the 1st Cavalry, informally called the "Corsicana Light Horse."

Conversation with Tony O'Donnell

A Texas Ranger Reenactor in the United Kingdom

I reenact the Old West over here in the UK, and one of the characters I portray is a Texas Ranger. My western name that I've used for 36 years is Tyrel Lee. It is not based on a real Ranger, but an amalgam of a few.

I started re-enacting while I was still in the army in 1978. I used to do WWII re-enactments as a member of 101st Screaming Eagles. My reenactment group today is the Wyoming Wild Bunch. It is one of the most authentic groups. We camp out

at all of our events under canvas and have our own chuck wagon built from the correct plans. We focus on the American West.

I came to Texas 20 odd years ago and went to The Alamo and City of Brackettville and the Stockyards at Fort Worth. When I came back to the UK, a Friend of mine JB, who used to own a Wild West town, created a group known as The Texas Rangers Association of Great Britain. We all had to swear an oath to uphold the values and history of the Texas Rangers. I received the certificate in January 1993. I was no 9.

The certificate reads:

The aim of the Association is to keep alive the Heritage & History of this Law Enforcement Agency, that is still in being to this day. Remembering at all times those early Rangers that made the History we wish to preserve.
